Guidelines for a paragraph:

- <u>topic Sentence</u>: the subject (motif) + direction (meaning/theme)
- Evidence: remember to include speaker and context.
- Explanation: teach the reader the meaning of this quote the direction that your topic sentence suggests. Move from the literal to the figurative.
- Remember: this is considered a body paragraph. You do not need to include a hook. Imagine that you have already written your introductory paragraph.
- Remember: you should never use a contraction or a personal pronoun (I, we, you).
